Congratulations to Mahina Anguay,

principal of Waimea High School, for being honored as the winner of the 12th annual Masayuki Tokioka Excellence in School Leadership Award. She was selected from among several outstanding principal nominees throughout the state. Though she would humbly acknowledge other administrators as equally deserving, her recognition comes as no surprise to the many students, teachers and community members who have seen her hard at work.

Though she has been at WHS for only 3 years, the school has seen many improvements take

place. It placed in the top 10 of state high schools for its outstanding graduation rate and has shown outstanding improvement in ACT composite scores. There has been a significant increase in the number of students in the UH system who have been able to take 100+ level classes in English and in Math. Fifty percent of students were proficient in the End of Course (EOC) Algebra II exam as compared to 33% in the state. Although she celebrates the school's success, she is constantly working on ways to make it better.

One notable project that called attention to her innovative and creative leadership is STREAM (Science, Technology, Resources, Engineering, Art/Humanities, Math), which has provided opportunities for students to create a product or service that would benefit the community. This reflects her belief that the school has the responsibility to prepare students for the real world by giving them opportunities in their related pathway.

As the winner of the leadership award, she received a \$25,000 cash award program. Part of the award money, \$15,000, is being spent for projects that will benefit the students. One is a Summer Bridge Program which will help middle school students transition successfully to WHS. Another will fund two new early college-level courses, Philosophy, and Intro to College, which students can take tuition free. Through a grant with Kaua'i Community College, the school already offers four math classes (College Algebra, Trigonometry, Calculus I and Calculus II), making a grand total of 18 possible college credits that can be earned while attending WHS. In addition, an English (ELA) 4-day boot camp will be offered this summer at the high school, lead by a KCC instructor.

She comes from a family of educators, several of whom our alumni might remember well. Her great-grandmother, Nora Chang, was a teacher and vice principal at WHS. Her grandmother, Juanita Mundon, taught English and Social Studies at WHS. Her mother, Puanani Gonsalves, now retired, taught at Kekaha School. Mahina understands the Westside and is working hard to provide a legacy of learning for student success in the real world.

- Waimea High School is recognized as one of 10 schools that has shown outstanding improvement in ACT composite scores and one of 10 schools with an outstanding graduation rate. In addition it has moved in high school ranking from second from the last to #32.

#### **MAJOR ACCOMPLISHMENTS:**

- The Foundation continues to support Waimea High School with grants. Last year the Foundation replaced a tricaster, which enabled the Media department to continue to broad cast student-produced television broadcasts to the school as well as to the community. - As of Dec, 2015, the Foundation has returned nearly \$300,000 to the school in grants, scholarships, and fundraising opportunities for school-related programs.
- The Foundation conducts a General Membership Meeting annually. The 2016 Spirit Award recipients for school and/or community service included Puanani Mundon Gonsalves, Nancy Fuertes Fuller, Itsue "Freckie" Shitanaka Okada and Danny Smith (Their story is included in this issue)
- Alumni classes continue to include our Luau/Awards Dinner as part of their class reunions. (Last year the Class of 1958 celebrated their collective 75th Birthday, and the Class of 1965 celebrated its 50th-Year Class Reunion with us.)
- The Second Annual Golf Tournament was a success despite having had to be re-scheduled due to weather. Thank you to Leo & Mahina Anguay for running the tournament.
- Scholarships were awarded to six outstanding seniors of the Class of 2016.
- Thanks to the Syngenta Company, the Foundation was able to conduct a fundraiser to replace this year's WAFF carnival.
- Our roster of Lifetime Members, Annual Members and Donors continues

As a result, the Foundation voted to "acoustacize" the cafeteria so that school events can be held in the cafeteria, which is the most ADH-accessi ble location for gatherings. This will be an expensive undertaking (\$30,000), but in will be in place before the next school year begins, and will be of benefit to the entire school for many, many years. yama) Combo, for 15 years, dancing, singing and playing musical instruments. Continues to be active at the Lihue Senior Center as a leader, instructor and volunteer. Attended the 1989 Smithsonian Folklife Festival representing Hawaii with Japanese folk dancing, singing and taiko. Nominated in 2013 as an Outstanding Older American. Love of teaching, sharing song and dance, taiko, and an unselfish zest for life everyday has defined her.

Six outstanding members of the Waimea High School Class of 2016 received \$1000 scholarships from the Waimea Alumni & Friends Foundation at the annual Scholarship Dinner on May 1, 2016 at the Waimea Neighborhood Center.

A hard worker with a "never-give-up" attitude, Hope Coyaso will be attending Hawaii Pacific University with the goal of becoming a social worker. "I would like to be a social worker, with a concentration in domestic issues to give back to Hawaii for all that it has allowed me to become by helping end bad cycles and instead to continue on as well as create good ones that enable our state to be the best it can be." Academically, Hope has been on the Honor Roll or Principal's List every year and earned awards in the Student Television Network "Sixty Second Silent Film" (1st Place) and the Health Occupations Students of America State Conference Biomedical Debate (1st Place). Hope is a threesport athlete (soccer, air riflery, tennis) as well as a student-leader (class vice president, student body secretary). "One of my favorite foods ever is poke, and it's what I would be if I was a local ethnic food despite that I went the majority of my life refusing to try it. Previously, I was scared of practically everything and those fears dictated my life, preventing me from trying a lot of new things; including poke. Everyone I knew loved it but it seemed questionable to me. In the past couple of years though, I began working on conquering fears and not letting them disable me from truly living life, opening myself up to new and exciting things. Playing sports for the first time, joining clubs, meeting new people competing, and yes, trying new foods. So I would be poke because to me it represents taking chances and the good things that result."

Recipient of numerous awards ranging from school to regional to national and even international, Julia Hirano has excelled in all areas. Even her travels have been to engage in educational experiences. She has an outstanding academic record, has been involved in club, class and student government leadership positions, and has been a four-sport athlete. Among these activities are four-year participation in Student Government, JROTC, Leo Club, KIF soccer, and participation on academic teams, generally in leadership positions. Julia will be attending Creighton University with a goal to become a pediatric dentist, hopefully on the west side of Kauai. "I would work toward bettering the health of children in my home town and help the community that made me who I am today. "If I could be any local ethnic food dish, I would be rice. Plain rice. Although this is considered to be a side dish and a supplement to most meals, it is a staple food that we all know and love. Rice can be used in many forms, whether it is in a musubi, with a bento, under a loco moco, or fried in a pan, this side goes with anything. Similar to the way rice goes with different meals, I love working with different types of people, I'm flexible and will mode to any problem or situations that come my way. I can change and adapt to different situations to help get a job done and complete any dish. Also, similar to the way rice completes a spam musubi, I am always willing to help people become the best that they can be. Just like how rice brings out other flavors, I raise people when they fall, and help them whenever they need a hand. What I love about rice, is the fact that alone it may be plain, but with others it becomes delicious. You may not notice when it's there, but you definitely notice when it's gone."

Inspired by watching a family member through illness, Genessa Jardin will be attending Pacific University in Oregon with hopes of becoming a pharmacist. "I want to be able to help people, and get them the medication they need to live a long, happy life." Genessa has been a Varsity Cheerleader since her freshman year and was a member of the HHSAA Medium Division State Championship team. Genessa has found great joy working with the youth of Hawaii and has been a mentor for Big Brothers and Big Sisters of Hawaii and has also been a student-leader and has participated in numerous school and community projects - Bettering Relations Among our Teens, care home visits, Interact and Leo Club activities. She has also received numerous academic awards. "If I had to be any local dish, I would I probably would be a Hawaiian Bento. Although I am not of Hawaiian background, I think that a bento would best represent me. It is both simple and complex, as am I. Just as a bento contains many different components, I am many different things and have many different personalities, yet in an overview, a bento is a bento, and I am who I am; one thing, one person. For example, just as a bento can be composed of rice, chicken, beef, salad, and kimchee, I am an athlete and a student, and I am bubbly and stern."

A young man with "leadership skills and a commitment to excellence, "Riley Saiki will be attending the University of Portland in Oregon next year, where he plans to study Engineering. He says, "After earning my degree in Engineering, I plan to find a job and find a place to live in Hawaii." One of Riley's coaches describes him as a team player with a passion for his sport, who led his varsity soccer team to its first KIF championship in ten years. He was selected a KIF All Star for Soccer and has participated in academic competitions at the State level - Science Olympiad, JROTC Leadership Academic Bowl. He has consistently been on the Principal's List since his freshman year. Riley is also committed to providing service to both his school and community and has participated in numerous projects with the school's service organizations - the Leo Club, the Interact Club, the JROTC program, and the JROTC Drill Team. "If I could be any ethnic dish, I would be an Ahi Poke Bowl. A local Hawaiian dish, it represents what I am about. A fish that can be attained nationwide, Hawaii has taken it and made it their own. It is prepared in a special way, making it unique to Hawaii. I was originally born in Oregon but moved to Hawaii in the third grade. I have since learned the Hawaiian culture and am different today than I was when I lived in Oregon, Me and an Ahi Poke bowl both have been changed in Hawaii."

Melia Okura is the recipient of the 2016 Daniel Suga Memorial Scholarship. A well rounded student who has participated in sports, student activities, JROTC events and band functions. Melia is a natural leader who knows when it is appropriate to follow but is also comfortable with taking the lead. Her advisors describe her as disciplined, dependable and goal-oriented. She has demonstrated strong leadership and time management skills. Melia is the recipient of numerous JROTC awards for leadership and character. She has also been an invaluable member of Tsunami Taiko, skilled in technique and the ability to organize and teach others and is an informative and entertaining emcee for the group. "I moved to the island of Kauai when I was in the 3rd grade, and every day I am thankful for the opportunity to grow up in such a beautiful place. Through the many organizations that I am a member of I have the honor to participate in numerous community service events." In the fall, Melia will be attending Brown University to study Computer Science. She plans a career in Cyber Security. "If I were an island food I would be the musubi. The musubi is the food of adventure and potential. It is a simple food, rice with spam wrapped in nori, but is is so much more than that. It can be customized to appeal to many different tastes. You can add a hotdog instead of spam, and there you have a snack that holds the same elements of a musubi, but with a different flavor. This represents my own ability to adapt to different situations. I am a well rounded student who has participated in sports, student activities, JROTC events and band functions. In a team I know when it is appropriate to follow but I am also comfortable with taking the lead. Whether you are going fishing, surfing or just cruising around the neighborhood the musubi is a popular food to bring with you wherever you go. I am also a person who enjoys to go out and try new things. Take me with you and we can go on an adventure of self discovery together."

Recipient of the first Kyoto Fujita Merit Scholarship is Brandon Ijima, who will be attending the University of Nevada, Reno and majoring in Engineering. With this degree in hand, he hopes to "work for a few years in a big company like Google, but then return to Kauai and find a job locally so I can give back to the community that has supported me all my life." A young man with an inquisitive mind and a knack for problem solving, Brandon has participated in sciencerelated activities. He has received awards in the Science Fair and the Science Olympiad, as well as Excellent and Outstanding Achievement Awards. During his tenure at Waimea High School, Brandon has been a member of the varsity cross country team and has also been active with various school service clubs. "If I were an ethnic, local food, I think I would be Saimin. Growing up on Kauai has exposed me to many different types of people and cultures. Saimin shares the same experience since it was inspired by Chinese, Filipino, and Japanese noodle dishes. Saimin is enjoyed by everyone here in the islands. I have friends from many different backgrounds and have been exposed to many different customs. My grandparents and parents use Hawaiian Filipino, Japanese, and Spanish terms in our conversations. They serve Chinese, Hawaiian Japanese, Filipino and Spanish foods that I have learned to enjoy. Many different cultures have made me who I am just like how many different groups of people helped develop Saimin back in the sugar plantation days.
